I/V clip Horia Mosadiq, Amnesty International Researcher on Afghanistan (in English):

"She has tuberculosis and she didn't receive any kind of assistance, any kind of medical assistance. She says that she went to the hospital and she was asking for medication, but unfortunately she didn't receive anything. She has six children and she is suffering from tuberculosis. And even she is complaining that she doesn't have any money to at least buy food to feel better."

Background: In December of 2008, Amnesty International researcher Horia Mosadiq travelled to Afghanistan. She visited several refugee camps in Kabul and Herat provinces, where she met and interviewed some of the more than a quarter of a million people who have been left homeless due to fighting, drought and insecurity.

02:44 Côte d'Ivoire

I/V Alex Neve, Amnesty International, in March 2003 (English):

"We've been concerned since September when these many neighbourhoods in Abidjan were burned, acts of vengeance, acts of cruelty, some of it actually an intentional government policy to destroy what were called 'precarious neighbourhoods', areas that were deemed by the government to be likely shelters for rebels and so many people have lost their homes as a result. We've heard reports that in the process of the burnings of some of those neighbourhoods people were beaten badly."

Background: This was the third Amnesty visit to the Ivory Coast since the break-out of civil war in September 2002. Following a visit to the armed opposition controlled north, the objective this time was to research violations committed by the government.

"This is just totally consistent with what we've been seeing of this type of missile strike, all week, the hole has been dug out here, a very small narrow deep hole, very small parts of missiles, and fragments penetrating metal work and walls with incredible intensity, you virtually can't find these fragments they've gone in so deep."

Background: In January 2009, Christopher Cobb-Smith a British weapons expert visited Gaza with Amnesty International. The visit followed the devastating bombing campaign launched by Israeli forces without warning on Gaza at the very end of 2008.

I/V Zenab Osman Abaker Atim, she is originally from Nori (Arabic)

"Again on our way we were stopped by Janjawid. They searched us around the waist. If you don't have money they want to kill your child. If you say no, they beat the child. When you gave them the choice to kill one but leave the other one, then they would beat both children. We got tired because we were moved so much. (She shows her feet). There were people on horses attacking on the ground and Antonovs bombing from the air and people falling down."

The campaign focuses on issues such as maternal mortality, slums, corporate accountability and making certain rights law.
